

Changing singular words ending in ‘y’ to an ‘ies’ ending when they become plurals.

‘Singular’ means just one person or thing. ‘Plural’ means several people or things. Some words end in ‘y’ when there is just one of them. When there are more than one of these, we drop the ‘y’ and add ‘ies’.

Your sentences should all include a **subordinate clause** in the middle of the sentence. Don't forget those commas too!

EXAMPLE PAIR OF SENTENCES:

The **baby, who was only three months old**, began to talk!

The **babies, who were only three months old**, began to talk!
