How To Play Pass The Parcel:

Pass the parcel is a great game to play at parties. These instructions will show you how to organise a game...

1. Choose the prize. This could be a toy or some sweets or chocolate. You should choose something that is not too small or expensive.
2. Wrap the prize carefully. You might like to use ribbons because this will be the last layer the children unwrap.
3. Use newspaper to wrap the other layers. You must not prepare more than ten layers as this will make the game go on for too long.
4. You can add a small sweet between each layer or even a dare (this shall make it more fun for older children).
5. You might like to try preparing two or three parcels, depending on how long your party lasts.
6. Sit the children in a circle and play music. The children must stop passing the parcel when the music stops and take off a layer of paper.
7. Make sure the music doesn't stop on the same child twice. The children will find this fairer.
